Young Writers Workshop (aged 10+): Writing Like a Wild Thing with Scot Gardner Friday 25 May Moe Library: 4pm to 6pm FREE EVENT

Scot will discuss with the students the idea of using personal narrative (our own stories) as a springboard into gripping fiction. Using the telling of real-life stories and brief timed-writing exercises, Scot will guide the students in the artful use of detail, showing emotion (rather than *telling*) and subduing the influences of their own internal editor to create strong personal voices on the page.

10.30am Demet Divaroren is a Melbourne-based writer, editor and creative writing teacher. Her writing has appeared in Griffith REVIEW, Island magazine, The Age Epicure, The Big Issue and From the Outer. She is the author of 'award winning novel 'Living on Hope Street' (Allen & Unwin, 2017) and the co-editor of the 'Coming of Age: Growing up Muslim in Australia' anthology, which was shortlisted for the CBCA's Book of the Year Award.

11.30am Alice Robinson's debut novel, *Anchor Point,* published by Affirm Press, was longlisted for the Indie Book Awards (debut fiction) and for The Stella Prize in 2016. She has a PhD in Creative Writing from Victoria University.

1pm Andrew Nette is a writer of fiction and non-fiction, reviewer and pulp scholar. He is the author of two novels, *Ghost Money*, a crime story set in Cambodia in the mid-nineties, and *Gunshine State*. He is coeditor of *Girl Gangs, Biker Boys, and Real Cool Cats: Pulp Fiction and Youth Culture, 1950 to 1980*, published by PM Press, and *Sticking It To the Man: Revolution and Counterculture in Pulp and Popular Fiction, 1956 to 1980*, to be published by PM in late 2019. 1.30pm Leslie Twentyman is a prominent youth outreach worker and community activist in the western suburbs of Melbourne. Raised in Braybrook, he is one of Victoria's best-known social campaigners on issues ranging from homelessness, drug abuse, prison reform and social welfare. In 1984, Twentyman and Ron Coleman, then owner of the *Western Times*, founded the 20th Man Fund to give ten young homeless people a Christmas party. Now The Les Twentyman Foundation, the fund has grown exponentially to become a vital resource for young people, dedicated to providing positive intervention and unconditional support to thousands of Australia's at-risk youth each year. Les Twentyman's work was formally recognised in 1994, when he was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia; in 2004, as a finalist for Australian of the Year; and in 2006, when he was awarded Victorian of the Year. www.20thman.com.au; www.ltfoundation.com.au

Scot Gardner became a writer after a chance meeting with a magazine editor while hitchhiking in East Gippsland. Scot's first fiction for young adults, *One Dead Seagull*, was published after he attended a writing camp with John Marsden. More than a decade later, his many books have found local and international favour and garnered praise and awards for their honest take on adolescent life. They include books like *White Ute Dreaming*, *Burning Eddy* and most recently *Happy as Larry*, winner of a WA Premier's Book Award for young adult fiction, and *The Dead I Know*, winner of the CBCA Book of the Year Award for Older Readers. Scot lives with his wife and some chickens in Yinnar South.
