### 2026 Award Nominee – Community Service of the year

**Jakey Sting Rae –  
Jakey's Mental Walk &  
Talks for Mental Health**

Every day in August, Jakey walked an average of 35 kilometres per day to raise money for a mental health charity. He raised over \$5,500 from donations and sponsors and gave it all to Bettermentall Australia - a mental health charity that offers peer support, mentoring and resources.

He also organised stalls at his event launch, which helped some of the small businesses who sponsored him get some recognition. Jake also displayed logos of different sponsors on his shirt each day during his walks and gave them a shout out on social media as a thank you.

Jakey managed to walk over 1,000 kilometres over the course of August, with a different friend walking with him each day, giving them the option to open-up and talk about their struggles if they wanted to. Jakey is a great friend and would help anyone in need and is highly liked in the community.

His 1,000 kilometre walk is a massive achievement, showing a lot of dedication, resilience and forward planning, whilst he overcame multiple challenges throughout the month.



### 2026 Award Nominee – Community Service of the year

**Ken Thompson**

Ken Thompson has been a dedicated and driving force to bring into existence and to keep operational the not-for-profit community radio station, Gippsland FM 104.7. Community radio was just being born when Ken and a group of community minded people started the radio station into being, initially operating from a shed, which Ken built in 1977.

In 2026, Ken will have been directly involved with Gippsland FM 104.7 for 50 years. Since those days Ken continues to: train presenters, successfully apply for funding for a variety of ethnic, community, operational, programs and equipment including \$100,000 for a transmission tower, prepare submissions to government bodies, mentor new presenters, and present weekly programs.

During this time, he has held many positions including Chairman of the Board of Directors, Secretary and Treasurer. He has trained many volunteers, in studio operation and the legalities of community broadcasting. He has written policies, mentored young broadcasters and recruited new volunteers.

Ken's ongoing commitment to community broadcasting extends beyond Gippsland FM. He has also served the Community Broadcasting Foundation for 10 years and acted as Treasurer for the Community Broadcasting Association of Victoria.

#### Willow House Community Support (Paid Forward Program)

Willow House Community Support Ltd is a grassroots volunteer-run organisation based in Newborough, Victoria, dedicated to supporting individuals and families facing hardship.

Through its community hub, Willow House provides free emergency food relief, clothing, hygiene products, children's items, and essential care packs for people experiencing homelessness, family violence, or financial distress.

The organisation plays a vital role in Latrobe City, delivering practical, person-centred assistance with compassion and respect. It also partners with local services and regularly hosts inclusive community events that promote connection, dignity, and wellbeing. Willow House has become a safe and welcoming space for people from all walks of life, including those experiencing isolation, trauma, or crisis.

Willow House is responsive to emerging needs, providing support during emergencies such as local power outages and natural disasters. Operated entirely by passionate volunteers, the organisation assists hundreds of families every month and continues to grow its impact through strong community ties and a commitment to making a difference.

The leadership team at Willow House consistently advocates for vulnerable members of Latrobe City. Their efforts include emergency response during floods and power outages and organising seasonal drives such as winter warmth packs and Christmas hampers.

#### Association of Filipino - Australians in Gippsland Inc. (SPAG) Filipino Fiesta Event

The Association of Filipino - Australians in Gippsland Inc. has been hosting Filipino Fiesta event on the second Sunday of November annually in Latrobe City since 2000. The event is held at the Morwell Immigration Park or Kernot Hall depending on the weather. The festival attracts hundreds of visitors from Warrnambool to Lakes Entrance.

Mid-day religious services open the festival followed by Ati-Atihan Indigenous Street Dance in their colourful cultural costumes. The dancing is performed by the community around the park and Mid Valley Shopping Centre as requested by the management. The Filipino Fiesta event is known for its vibrant culture, eclectic music, and graceful dances. It's a Festival of unity, gratefulness, and togetherness.

The fiesta welcomes everyone and typically involves several other activities. These include beauty pageant, cultural dances, musical performances, food fairs and various competitions and games to entertain the crowd.

For community engagement, the Filipino Fiesta contributed a tremendous role to keep multicultural heritage alive and provides a wealth of multiculturalism to be enjoyed by the Latrobe City community.

**International Women's  
Group Inc - Harmony Day**

In March 2025, IWG, a volunteer-run organisation, facilitated their annual Harmony Day event which provided a safe forum for people of diverse cultural and social backgrounds to connect with their local community over a two-course meal, entertainment, activities, and speeches from esteemed community leaders.

The celebration was introduced with a traditional dance performed by a local African dance group, highlighting and platforming their rich and thriving culture.

The event was enriched with numerous musical and dance performances from people of all ages, cultural backgrounds and sexual orientations in the spirit of Diversity Week.

The day was attended by over 90 people, who enjoyed an excellent day of empowering speeches from the Deputy Mayor and Gippsland Multicultural Services, entertainment provided by Ken Shing and local multicultural dancing groups, a fashion parade and Henna station.

IWG is a not-for-profit women-founded organisation established in 1996 run by volunteers of the community, whose projects such as their Harmony Day 2025 Celebration promote their core values of inclusivity and connecting with others.

This vibrant annual event creates opportunities for people of all ages to voluntarily step into roles of leadership and teamwork, which helps to uplift and bring value to Latrobe City and wider community.

People travel from Melbourne to attend. It's fantastic to see everyone in the room listen when Jann - Branch Leader/President shares her story and explains how this Branch came about.

This event is to raise much needed awareness of what Knitted Knockers Traralgon Branch can do for women within the community that have had a partial or a full mastectomy from Breast Cancer.

#### Latrobe Emergency & Community Services Expo

The Latrobe Emergency and Community Services Expo 2024, held on Sunday 27 October at the Latrobe Regional Airport, was a landmark event that truly united the community. Delivered as a free event and coordinated through the collaboration of multiple emergency services and community agencies, the Expo showcased the power of partnership and the shared commitment to building a safer, stronger Latrobe City.

The Expo went beyond displays and demonstrations. It provided families with a unique opportunity to engage directly with emergency service personnel, explore equipment, and gain practical knowledge in a welcoming, hands-on environment. Local support services also played a vital role, highlighting the assistance available before, during, and after emergencies, ensuring the community left more informed, supported, and connected.

Importantly, the event removed barriers to participation by being free of charge, making it accessible to all families. It also supported the local economy by providing opportunities for food vendors and children's entertainment businesses, while promoting the Latrobe Regional Airport as a vital regional asset.

The true success of the Expo lies in the strong relationships and trust it fostered between agencies and the community, leaving a legacy of resilience, support, and pride across Latrobe City.

#### Traralgon Community Christmas Parade, Market and Grottos

The Parade Market and Grottos event combines the spectacle of the Parade, the fun of the Grottos and the festive stalls of the Market to celebrate the joys of Christmas. It's a fantastic family event that attracts large crowds every year. The pleasure that it brings the local community is clear from the feedback on Facebook pages and from personal feedback received by all the committee members who work throughout the year to bring the event together.

It's an event that inspires the community and the businesses who contribute time, effort, funding and advertising towards the delivery of the event, all of which makes it free to those who attend.

Over 60 stalls occupy the market. More than 30 parade floats are entered into the parade, typically from community groups such as the Scouts. The two grottos are a great showcase for Santa and the work of the Latrobe Theatre Players.

This is a truly community inspired event with members of the major community groups, Apex, Lions, Traralgon Community Development Association, Royal Exchange Cork Club, and the two Rotary Clubs, Traralgon and Traralgon Central making up the Committee, assisted by Latrobe City Council and Traralgon Centre Plaza.

She does home visits to check on people, helps with their shopping, and provides moral support when visiting doctors, lawyers, etc, especially the elderly. Over the years, she has contributed to many organisations and community in many ways, doing different things at different times, too numerous to document.

She is a great cook and shares her dishes. She is a member of the International Women's Group (IWG) and her invaluable voluntary contribution is greatly appreciated by this group and others.

Jenny is a committee member of the Traralgon Table Tennis Association. She runs the three pennant tournaments each year and organises and runs the veterans tournament. She is the first to put up her hand to help with any duties to assist in the smooth running of events held during the year.

Jenny is Treasurer on the committee of a weekly community group held at Gippsland Regional Sports Stadium (GRISS). The group consists of up to 70 women who simultaneously participate in soft tennis or chair yoga or a walk around the neighbourhood.

Jenny epitomises the quiet achiever as she sets up the tea and coffee facilities, warmly welcomes everyone, collects money and records payments.

Jenny also sews costumes for the showtime events for the Scouts. Prior to this, she was heavily involved with the Girl Guides doing a similar role.

Jenny regularly assists in opening and closing the table tennis building on Monday night's competition, making numerous phone calls to organise substitute players ensuring the night runs smoothly. Jenny is so friendly and happy to chat with everyone.

**Blake Bourne**

Blake Bourne has made an extraordinary contribution to the Gippsland community through his advocacy for mental health and his commitment to creating inclusive spaces. In 2025, Blake became the youngest person to run 380 kilometres across the Simpson Desert, raising over \$30,000 for Speak and Share. His efforts funded workshops for more than 1,500 students, helping to open dialogue around mental wellbeing. Locally, Blake leads the Traralgon Run Club, a free weekly initiative that brings people together to support one another.

He also hosts free community events such as Sip and Dip and The Uncomfortable Challenge, which encouraged over 40 individuals and businesses to step outside their comfort zones and engage in meaningful conversations. Blake's story, rooted in personal recovery, has inspired thousands and continues to break down stigma around mental health.

He regularly speaks at events and shares his story online, using his platform to encourage vulnerability and connection. Blake's work with Speak and Share reflects his long-term dedication to youth mental health. While still early in his journey, Blake's leadership has earned widespread respect.

His impact is felt not only through the funds he's raised, but through the culture of care and courage he's cultivated across Latrobe City.

**Amber Ericksen**

Amber Ericksen has dedicated her life to advancing disability rights, inclusion, and stronger community connections in Gippsland. As founder of Clarity Services and Support and Latrobe Support Coordination, she has championed funding for people with disability and created innovative programs that turn inclusion into action.

Through her Thrive Program, Amber has designed industry tasters, job skill development, and micro-enterprise mentoring that provide participants with practical pathways to study, volunteering, and employment. Recognising the deep impact of food insecurity, she has extended Thrive into meal production and distribution, ensuring both skills training and community nourishment are achieved.

Amber's social enterprises have served as living models of inclusion. The Old Gippstown Tea Room employed and trained people with disability while providing a welcoming community hub. The café was awarded the People's Choice Award in the Good Access is Good Business category, acknowledging her commitment to making access and inclusion part of everyday business.

She has been a strong advocate for equity, working alongside carers, families, and businesses to challenge outdated attitudes, break down barriers, and build sustainable, inclusive opportunities. Amber's contributions embody her vision of a community where every person has the chance to belong, contribute, and thrive.

For most of her time Jackie has been the Store and Sorting Supervisor and declined offers of payment for her time and contributions. Jackie is a passionate volunteer and community member. She has led integrated partnerships, linking the op-shop and Lifeline Gippsland with the Churchill Neighbourhood Centre, Men's Shed, CFA, the old IGA and the Chemist. All groups have come together, initiated and led by Jackie to support the work of Lifeline Gippsland, contributing to the organisation's participation on the national 13 11 14 crisis line.

Jackie often brings together family, friends and community members to help run the op-shop, ensuring all funds raised go toward supporting the crisis line. Jackie is driven by her passion to be inclusive and engaging with her community and supports Lifeline's vision of a suicide free Australia. Jackie has volunteered approximately 25,000 hours with Lifeline Gippsland. Jackie also volunteers with other groups in Latrobe City.

Jackie is well known and loved by the Churchill community, due to what she gives to others, as well as her community spirit and willingness to help people.

Margie is one of those people who sees a situation that requires some supportive action and rather than walk on by her first instinct is "What can I do to help?" Whether it's participating in a community organisation or helping an individual, she is adept at making a difference.

Margie has been a driving force behind some of Churchill Neighbourhood Centre's biggest community projects — the revival of food bank, the introduction of the Container Deposit Scheme, and the development of the Disaster Recovery Trailer.

Margie has a history of giving back to the community through her contribution as an entrepreneur alongside her husband Pete. Margie has always supported the local community, giving back to a wide range of social enterprises and local clubs.

Margie's work has left a lasting mark on Churchill and will continue to shape the community for years to come.

Linda currently runs line dance classes throughout Gippsland, teaching a total of six levels ranging from beginners to intermediate level.

Linda also holds monthly social activities, that with the success of her teaching career, now bring other students from groups all around Victoria, and interstate.

Linda has always showed compassion to all who attend her classes. She understands that everyone learns at a different pace and has a special gift of teaching to make it possible for all to enjoy, with whatever ability a person has.

Her teaching style allows for variation in dances, to support those with joint limitations, keeping everyone moving. Over the years Linda has donated over \$125,000 to Lifeline through her dancing efforts.

She gives her services to other dance groups to teach workshops at their events. Local nursing and aged care homes have been gifted with Linda bringing her classes along for fun dance displays – enjoyed by all!

#### Robert Sharrock

During his time working at one of the busiest school crossing areas in Latrobe City, Rob Sharrock realised that today's generation of children didn't seem to have embraced the love of reading that children of his generation had.

Rob set out to change that and for the past seven years has almost singlehandedly set up the Books4Kids project. Since its inception in late 2018 it has provided in excess of 80,000 free children's books to many schools throughout Latrobe City to aid in reducing poverty based illiteracy in primary school aged children.

Rob's volunteering history and assistance to the community is impressive including:

- Eight years as the Secretary of the inaugural Moe/Yallourn Rail Trail Committee of Management.
- Nine years with the Lions Club of Moe of which he is the current President. He is seen as one of the tireless workers at the fortnightly sausage sizzles in Moe, where the club has raised over \$1 million for the local community.

Now into his third year as a member of the Old Gippstown Heritage Park Committee of management and as a park volunteer, he regularly assists with the maintenance of the park's gardens, buildings and artefacts.
